

Arizona Way Out West & Wacky Bingo:

Have students read Pages 40-43 and 82-83 in "Arizona Way Out West & Witty," or read it for them, before playing.

To begin, give each student a bingo card. Explain that each word in each box is the correct answer to a question. If they get 5 answers in a row – whether vertical, horizontal or diagonal – they should hold up their card and shout BINGO! That person wins a prize. (It could be a small token like a pencil, or donated tickets from a sports team or a fun museum, a "skip one homework assignment" card, or anything else that will make it fun.)

Next, the librarian or teacher states the number of the question before reading it and instructs students to write that number in the square in which the correct answer appears. (This enables the instructor to know if they answered the questions correctly.) *Example: "Number 1: A roasted mouse and sheep poop tea were thought to cure BLANK. When you see the answer for Number 1, write a 1 in that square."* If someone gets bingo write away, you might want to play again, but start with the questions that you did not get to yet.
